Dear Friends,

The 2023-2024 school year is in full swing and our staff and students are working and learning together once again. At the beginning of each new academic year, we are filled with **feelings of excitement and rejuvenation**. The fall time is a renewal season in education where students and staff begin afresh. We have had a great start to the year and are pleased to share some updates with our community.

From **new and exciting academic opportunities to school safety upgrades, Express athletic accomplishments, and more**, this late fall 2023 newsletter provides you with the latest and greatest highlights so far this year. Forever optimistic, we know the best is always yet to come.

The quick and evolving landscape of technology continues to advance our output in terms of both academics and school safety. This summer, our technology team installed nearly 300 new Promethean boards across our classrooms. These new generation smart boards can record lessons, share recorded lessons with remote and absent students, screen share in real-time for hybrid and blended learning situations and more. This smart technology improves the student experience, providing seamless ways in which students can access their curriculum and instruction. Of course, with tech saavy students comes security interventions. I encourage you to read more about how AI (Artificial Intelligence) is playing a part in student digital safety in schools on page 5.

Elmira takes a proactive approach to ensuring the safety of all students, staff and families. We believe that safety truly begins with the social and emotional wellbeing of our students and families. The District employs school social workers, school counselors, student support counselors, and psychologists who assist the District in identifying early warning signs in students and early intervention/prevention strategies. The District also has a strong partnership with Chemung County for use of the HOPE and TIG suicide prevention programs. In addition, we employ a school based mental health program at each grade and building level. Additionally, school safety continues to be at the forefront of our capital improvement planning. We have installed a variety of new upgrades to our building and technology infrastructures that meet 21st century security needs in our schools.

Of course, all of these procedures and software upgrades work best when we are united as a community. Safety begins with all of us, each taking the responsibility to ensure our collective wellbeing. If you see something, please say something. Trusted adults in our schools are safe confidants that can help mitigate concerns. New this year, we have added a "Conflict Resolution Form" to our website for students and families to complete if they are experiencing conflict or observe conflict that needs adult intervention. This can be found on the District homepage at elmiracityschools.com. This is just one more way in which our families can reach District personnel.

As always, our ultimate goal is for each student to enjoy their school experience, feel safe among peers and staff, and reach graduation by earning a diploma. There are many stages and ages throughout the course of a student's path and as educators, creating great experiences for young people is our life's work.

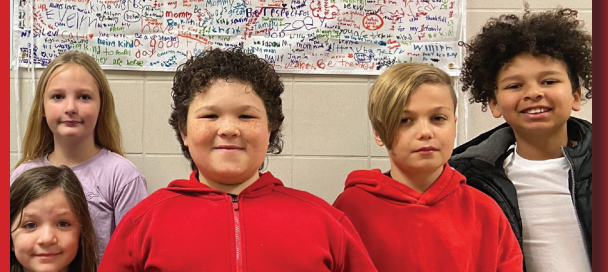

Red Ribbon Week at Broadway Elementary

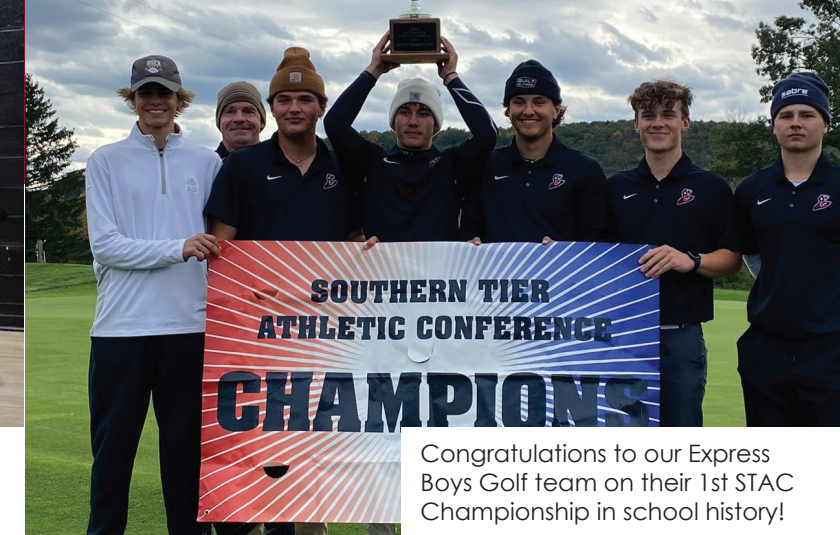
As part of our ongoing Community Schools programming, our partners at CASA-Trinity helped to bring awareness to Red Ribbon Week this year at Broadway Elementary School.

Reading Under the Lights | Debuts at Elmira High School

The 1st Annual *Reading Under the Lights* program was held on Friday, October 27, 2023 at Elmira High School stadium and followed a successful Trunk or Treat event. Both events, free to District families, were attended by hundreds of students and families.

"Family engagement is an important key to learning. We were very happy to provide a space for kids and their families to spend time together. Literacy should be celebrated and this is just one more way in which we try to build excitement for learning," says Jay Hillman, Director of Educational Services at Elmira City School District.

With support of the Innovative Approaches to Literacy grant, the District handed out over 1,000 books to students as they entered the stadium. Families bundled up with blankets and their new books to read together. The District's Literacy team also developed a storytime which was illuminated over the scoreboard. Milk and cookies were handed out as families left for the evening.

The event helped to raise awareness about the importance of reading at least 20 minutes a day at home.

Digital Security

Throughout the development of technology, we've seen many things come and go that have greatly impacted public education. Over time, schools have adapted to involve tech solutions in classrooms. It has been clear throughout history that new innovations that are introduced can work alongside education. Artificial Intelligence (AI) is the newest wave of innovation that is changing the way we engage with technology.

With technology in the fingertips of our students hands 24/7, digital security and safety is increasingly important.

The District has partnered with Gaggle Safety Management solution, a software company that helps to manage student safety on school-provided technology. Gaggle proactively helps to ensure students are safely and correctly using school-provided digital tools.

Gaggle uses a combination of artificial intelligence and trained safety experts to review students' use of online tools within Microsoft 365 and provide real-time analysis of potentially concerning behavior or content. Gaggle's technology scans students' accounts for harmful content and alerts school officials if students show signs of self-harm, depression, thoughts of suicide, substance abuse,

cyberbullying, credible threats of violence against others, or other harmful situations. With Gaggle, Elmira City School District is better equipped to proactively identify students who are struggling, provide support where needed, and foster a safer school environment.

As a web filter, Gaggle is another valuable tool to support and protect our students.

A web filter is software designed to restrict or control the online content that a user is allowed to access. The intention is to keep someone or something out of an unhealthy area. The District's goal in using Gaggle is to provide early warning detection of harmful situations and to help staff and administrators identify and address digital citizenship, bullying prevention, and mental health issues.

About Gaggle

Since 1999, Gaggle has been the leader in helping K-12 districts manage student safety on school-provided technology. Using an effective combination of artificial intelligence and trained safety experts, the solution proactively assists districts 24/7/365 in the prevention of student suicide, bullying, inappropriate behaviors, school violence, and other harmful situations.

With technology at their fingertips 24/7, it's more important than ever to ensure our students are behaving appropriately in the digital world. Parenting in the tech-age is uncharted. This ritual has become so familiar, that even on the days that Maggie isn't at drop-off, Officer Segur seeks out Addie to make sure she has treats for Maggie to bring home. There is no measurable value to quantify this type of special bond.

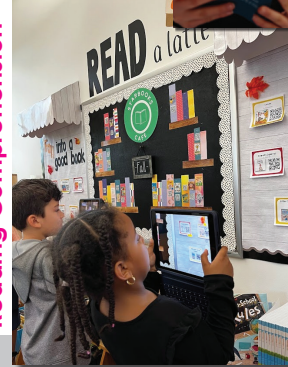

The Broadway Academy (BWA) Student Success Team is comprised of BWA staff who support and promote the literacy work of the ECSD Innovative Approaches to Literacy grant within Broadway Academy. Our team includes classroom teachers, a librarian, administrators, a teaching assistant, a data curriculum coordinator, and a school secretary.

One of the grant's initiatives is to ensure students have access to free books (to take home & keep) and last year BWA was fortunate enough to hold two free book giveaways to our students which resulted in us having some leftover books. Our Student Success Team decided that we'd like for those books to go out into the community, therefore, we plan to stock any local little libraries with our surplus book giveaway books. The team started with the little library outside of the Bethany Lutheran Church on Walnut Street and plan to stock another one outside of Woodlawn Cemetery.

Jace Ripley, currently a 6th grade student at Hendy Elementary School, has been giving back to the community now for many years. From can tabs to toys and significant cash donations, Jace's love for community continues to flourish.

In the last year, Jace alone has donated over \$2,500 to local charities. Jace donated \$1,200 to the Neighborhood Transformation Center, \$900 to the Children's Miracle Network and \$500 to Toys for Tots last holiday season.

Jace's most recent cause is the Warm the Children charity in Chemung County. Now in year two, the Warm the Children program was brought to Chemung County by Kelly Emanuel and her daughter. Warm the Children provides PK-6 grade students in Chemung County the opportunity to go shopping at our local JcPenney for new coats, boots, gloves and hats. Jace has raised \$500 and is donating it to Warm the Children and is donating it to the organization this year.

"It is such a kind and generous thing for Jace to do. At a time when many kids would choose to spend their savings on video games or sneakers, Jace is gifting his hard earned money to a program that helps kids; specifically kids in his own school and school district," says Kelly Emanuel from Warm the Children.

Jace's community spirit isn't coincidence. His late father, Chris Ripley, is recognized in Elmira as a true community person. A banner is hung in his name at the baseball field 3 at Pirozollo Park behind the fire station near Hendy School. And the local fishermen community continue to honor him during the annual Rockbass tournament on Keuka.

"Jace has always been a very special human. He volunteers serving food at the Elmira Elks Lodge on Thursday nights during the cornhole league. The club members and cornhole players give him tips that he collects for his charities," says Karyn Ripley, Jace's Mom.

School spirit begins with school pride, an important aspect of a successful student experience

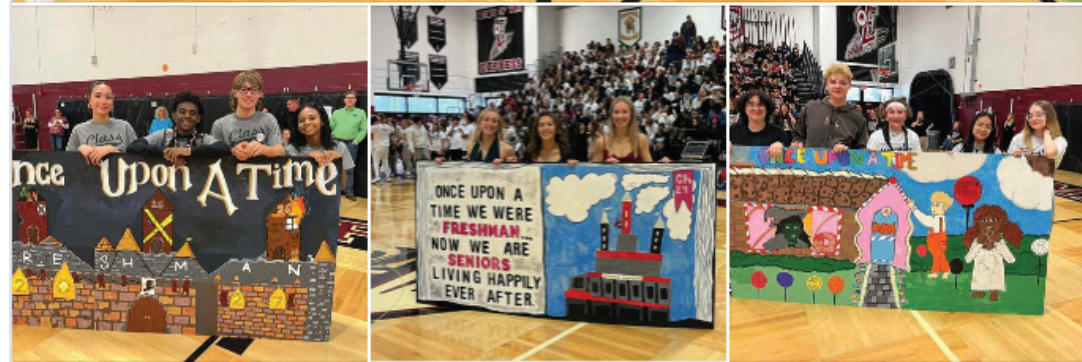

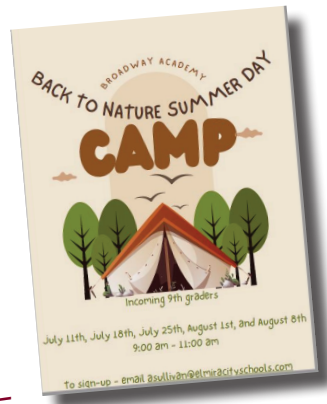
Summer Express Week for New Middle School Students

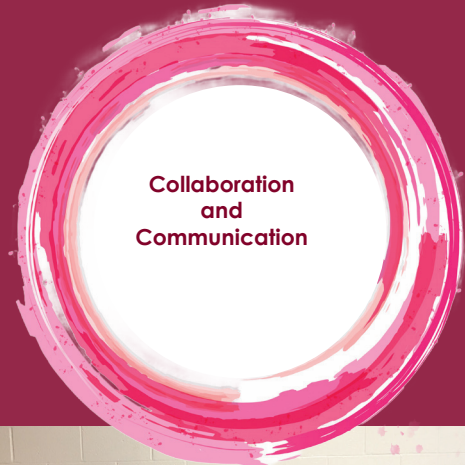

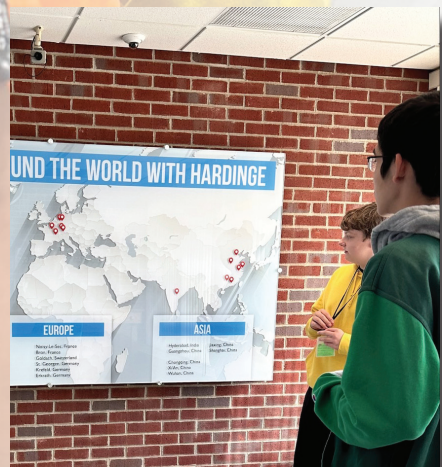
Overall, the students learned about an industry that has been around for over a hundred years.

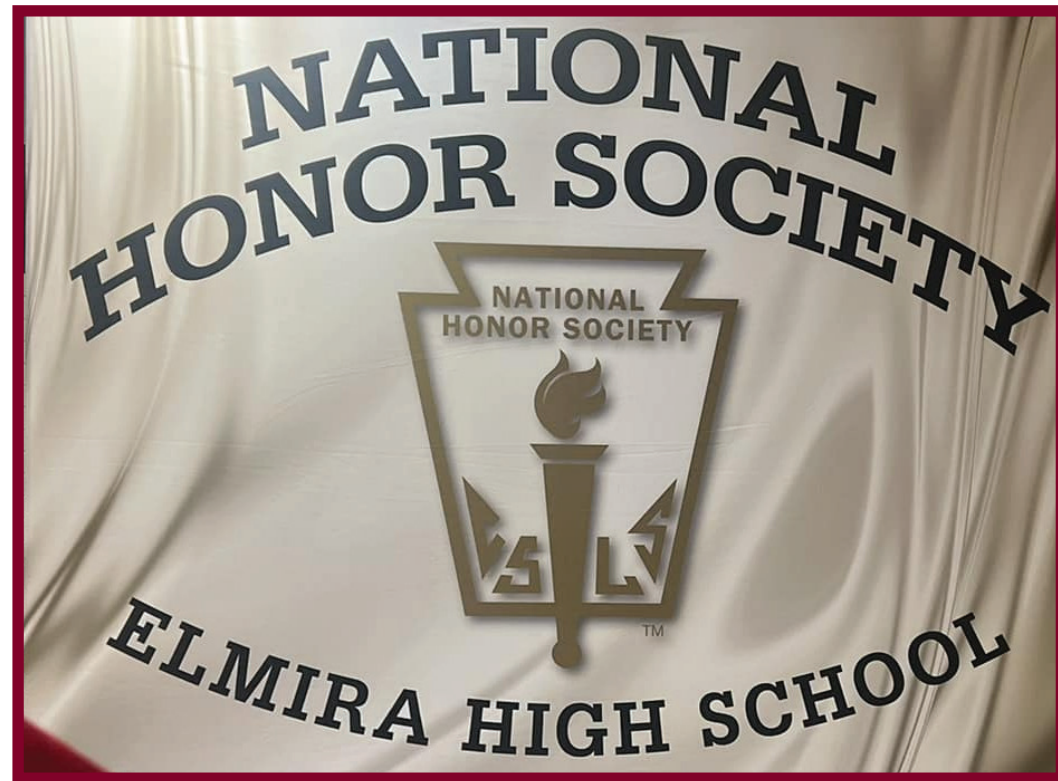
