Unified Sports | Inclusion and Equity in Athletics

Team sports bring people together. Special Olympics Unified Sports® teams do that too and much more.

Since spring of 2018, the New York State Public High School Athletic Association and Special Olympics New York have teamed up to introduce Unified Sports to NYSPHSAA member schools. The Elmira City School District quickly became a member school and first introduced a Unified Sports Basketball team. The following year, the District added a Unified Bowling Team. New to the 2022-2023 school year, the District is excited to be a part of a new Unified Sports soccer program.

Unified Sports is a program in which students with and without intellectual disabilities play together--on the field, on the court, in the gym. It's an opportunity for all ECSD students to come together and do something fun. The purpose of a Unified Sports team is to provide authentic, competitive opportunities for students with intellectual disabilities to participate in athletics. Active inclusion through athletics provides educational benefits to all participants. Students with and without intellectual disabilities will have opportunities to educate, motivate and become agents of change in their communities.

"Our Unified Sports programs offer all students an opportunity to learn and grow through athletics. Our Unified coaches Dave Stonitsch and Brian Beebe do a great job working with both our partners and athletes to instill the importance of sportsmanship and citizenship through athletics. As a former Unified Sports coach, I'm extremely proud of the opportunities we are able to provide through our Unified programs and look forward to their continued growth," says Zachary Lloyd, Athletic Director for the Elmira City School District.

An important feature of creating a socially inclusive school climate is engaging the entire school community in the process. An inclusive school climate that fosters understanding and respect for all can influence how students think and act within and beyond the school. School-wide opportunities focused on social inclusion raise awareness and create an educational environment where respect and acceptance are the norm and all students feel included and engaged. Smile | Dental Care at School

As part of our ongoing Community Schools initiative, the District is pleased to welcome back Mosaic Health Community Dentistry into our Elmira schools. This is a great option for students and busy families -- this mobile dental program provides on-site dental services during the school day!

School-based dental programs are one of the most efficient ways to reach children and their parents.

The primary focus of the school-based program is to provide quality, affordable, and accessible dental services to children, especially those in rural non-fluoridated communities who might not otherwise receive care. Free dental screenings and dental health and nutrition education is provided to students in Elmira, as well as a toothbrush, floss, and homecare instructions at no cost to our families. Enrolled Elmira students can also receive preventive dental services that include X-rays, teeth cleaning, fluoride varnish treatment, and/or dental sealants.

The dental team also teaches our students how to floss and brush their teeth the correct way, what snacks are healthiest, and how plaque and the decay process happen.

The Community Dentistry Program is available to students in all buildings in the Elmira City School District during the 2022-23 school year. Applications can be found in the Parent Resource Guide or on the District website.

Building Relationships | Team Day at Ernie Davis Academy

Human connections are at the cornerstone of all learning. At Ernie Davis Academy, our staff and students are developing connections in new ways.

Team Days, scheduled before long holiday weekends and breaks, are days dedicated to team building at Ernie Davis Academy. Activities, like field games, science experiments, hikes and more, allow students and staff the time to develop stronger relationships and trust among each other. As well, team building activities are a great way to help students learn how to communicate with each other effectively which is one of the most important skills a middle school student can learn.

Overall, the goal is to build relationships in order to create smoother transitions for students and to reduce conflict.

“Team Days are days when our teams of teachers plan activities that get students collaborating with each other, having fun, learning about each other, and building relationships with each other and staff.

The activities for the day are centered around our focus traits each month -- examples include being responsible and kind,” says Mr. Colin Werfelman, Ernie Davis Academy Principal.

Students who feel connected to school are more likely to succeed-- they have better school attendance, grades, and test scores and stay in school longer. Students who attend classrooms with higher emotional support are more likely to exert effort to understand difficult concepts. Building these relationships requires perspectives that embrace positive attitudes and beliefs, cultural and linguistic competence, an understanding of the needs and experiences of students, and an understanding of the school environment.

Relationships are the positive connections between students, adults and peers that foster positive social interaction and establish a nurturing environment of trust and support in schools.

Athletes in Service | Peer-to-Peer Connections at Broadway

Mr. Timothy Reidy, a ninth grade teacher and Express athletic manager, is doubling down on his role and providing new opportunities for his student athletes to serve in meaningful ways during the school day.

Weekly, student athletes at Broadway Academy walk across campus to the 3-6 grade halls of Broadway Elementary. Student athletes are serving as mentors in classrooms for 30-45 minutes, building connections and assisting elementary students with important math and reading lessons.

“My third grade students absolutely love having their ninth grade mentors in the classroom. Most of the time, it's just me teaching lessons and helping each student individually. To have added buddies in the room, those that my students look up to, is so special. Often, difficult math concepts or reading lessons are understood when explained by the older students. It is such a great connection,” says Mrs. Katy Mustico, third grade teacher at Broadway Elementary School.

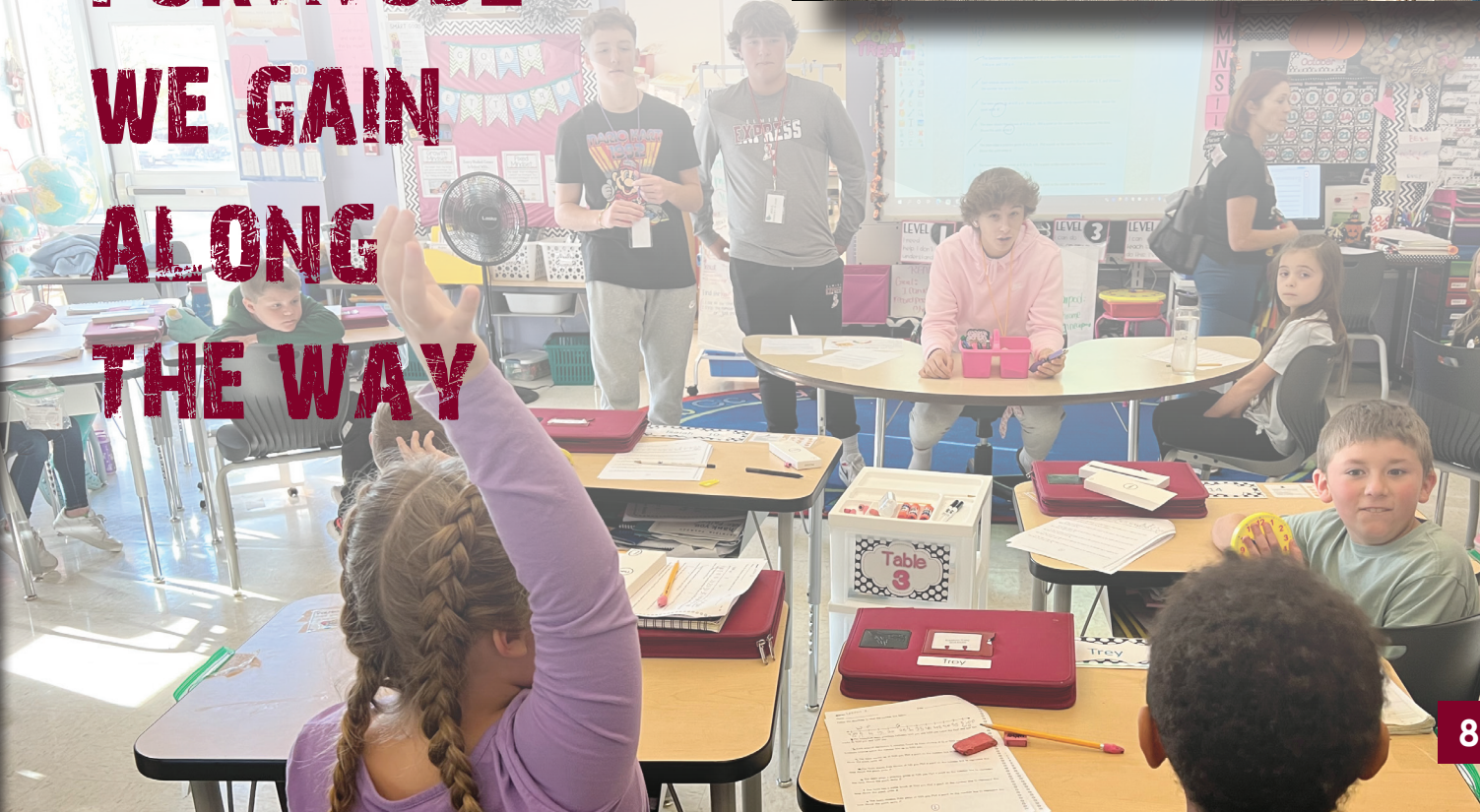
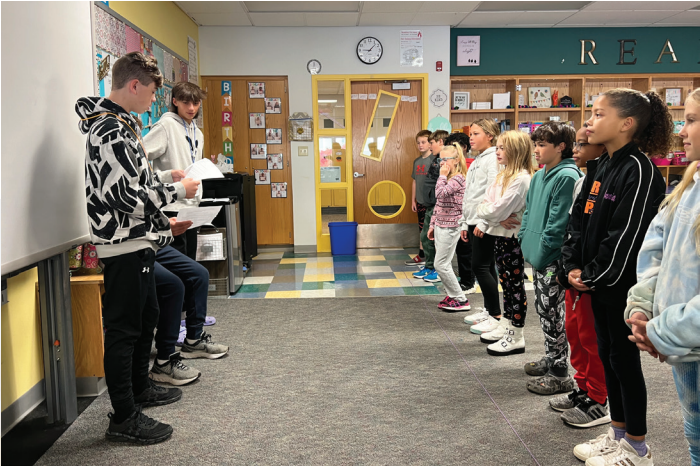
“I really hope this Athlete-in-Service program will continue at Broadway Elementary and eventually expand to other elementary schools. We are building something so much more than just added support - mentoring across grades builds our Express family and helps with transitions for our students,” says Mr. Reidy.

THE FORTITUDE WE GAIN ALONG THE WAY

Occasionally, our ninth grade students' roles pivot from mentor to teacher. For important lessons like social and emotional learning, the District's Trauma Informed Care Specialist and Yoga Instructor, Jessica Janowsky, teaches the ninth grade mentors lessons that they then instruct in elementary classrooms.

“Student mentors, our athletes, become the teachers and really do a great job engaging our young students. Kids are so eager to learn and hear from the older students and it is so important for these role models to play an active role in their educational experience. This is how we build tolerance, understanding and inclusion,” says Jessica Janowsky.

The Athletes-in-Service program will continue throughout the year and Mrs. Carrie Rollins, Broadway Principal, along with the team of teachers and other administrative faculty, are making plans to expand the program more ECSD schools.

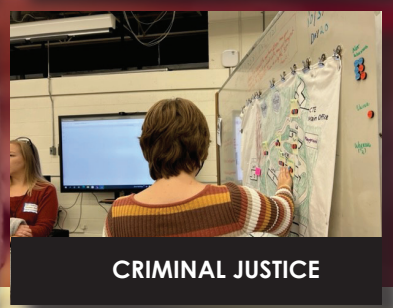

Every Thursday is Virtual Career Day at Fasset Elementary School on "THINK ABOUT YOUR FUTURE THURSDAY!"

Each morning at Fasset, our students in grades Pre-K - 2 tune into Principal Mrs. Mary Cox's morning announcements by video from their classrooms. They begin with the Pledge of Allegiance and Falcon pledge and then they hear practical morning updates like the weather, special programs and calendar updates. Then, each Thursday, they are joined by a special guest from the community to learn more about careers!

"What does a firefighter do? What is the role of a doctor in our community? How can I become a mentor? I'd like to be a veterinarian! When I grow up, I want to be a principal just like Mrs. Cox!"

These are just some of the things we hear on Thursday mornings when our students react to all of the possibilities for their futures! College and career readiness is an important part of the lesson here, and exposing students to possibilities early helps them later in their life.

"Of course our young learners are just beginning to understand what careers are and we don't expect them to know what they want to be when they grow up yet. But they can begin to think about how the things that they like to do (and are good at) can translate to a job someday," says Mrs. Cox, Principal of Fasset Elementary School.

"Plus, exposing kids from an early age to careers beyond the ones around them (parents, teachers, friends, movies) opens the door to future readiness and broadens their world view of work," continues Mrs. Cox.

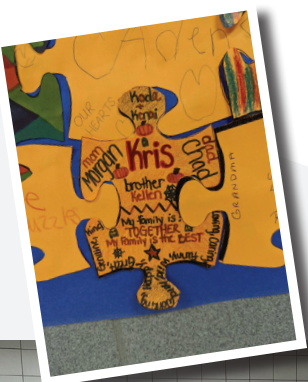

Graduating from High School Ready for College and Career - All youth should receive a quality high school education and graduate with the skills and tools needed to advance to post-secondary education or training.

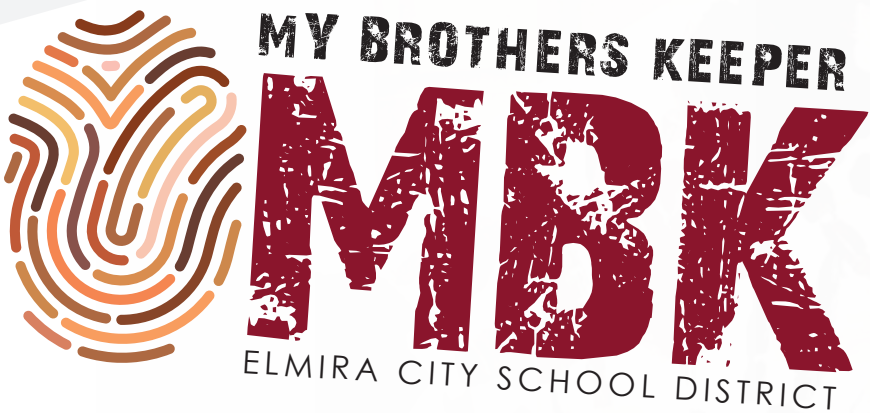
Completing Postsecondary Education or Training - Every student should have the option to attend postsecondary education and receive the education and training needed for the quality jobs of today and tomorrow.

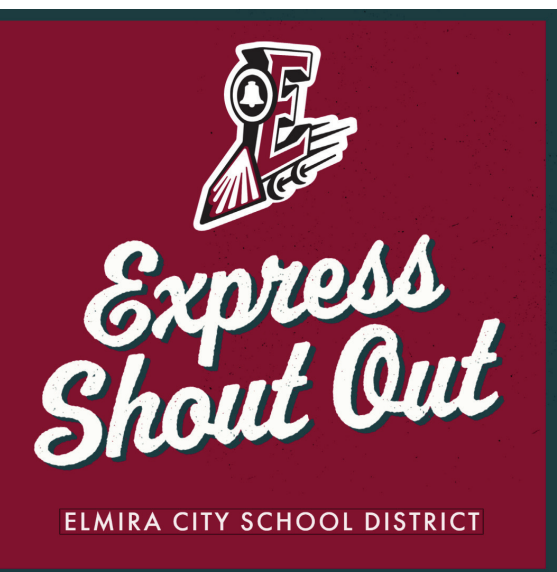
